A Note from the Pastor

Ascribe to the Lord the glory of his name; worship the Lord in holy splendor.

-Psalm 29:2

What is worship?

If someone asked you to define worship, what would you say? Webster, of course, has a definition. Presbyterians might quote from our Book of Order (our denominational "quide book"), where our Directory for Worship states, "Christian worship gives all glory and honor, praise and thanksgiving to the holy, triune God. We are gathered in worship to glorify the God who is present and active among us - particularly through the gifts of Word and Sacrament. We are sent out in service to glorify the same God who is present and active in the world" (W-1.0101). Both Webster and the Book of Order have good definitions. But, as Jesus asked the disciples when he told them to confess who they say he is, what do you say about worship?

My go-to definition of worship is "hanging out with God because of God." I honestly can't remember if I heard that somewhere or if I made it up. I like it because it sums up nicely what I believe about worship. It's hanging out with God because of God. It might involve a larger

community in body or in Spirit. It might involve music and a sermon, or it might be silence in the woods. The point is I am there, and God is there, and we're going to spend time together. It's even more powerful when others are hanging out with God with me.

Anything can be an act of worship. At a conference I attended last June, the keynote speaker told us the word "worship" comes from the same root word for "worth" so worship is loving God and ascribing worth to God. The speaker, Claudio Carvalhaes, said, "Worship doesn't excite us if we don't know what worship is the rest of the week." He went on to say worship isn't what you *like*. It's what you *do*. Anything can be an act of worship. Hanging out with God because of God — you are in worship.

Most conversations I hear about worship aren't about what worship *is*, but about *how* we worship. Should we do intinction or should we stick to passing

the communion plates? Why do we use the words "worship assistant" instead of "liturgist"? Why do we use the NRSV translation of the Bible? And honestly, who picks these hymns??? (I do, by the way.)

Every church does worship just a little bit differently, which adds to the richness and diversity of the faith. I usually follow a lectionary, which is a cycle of scripture readings. Not everyone does. This fall we followed the narrative lectionary. This winter I'm back in the Revised Common Lectionary because I found the readings to be more meaningful. Sometimes I jump out of the lectionaries all together and do my own sermon series. I pick my scriptures and sermon themes, then I pick music. I do not tell the music director what to do: he picks the music for the preludes. postludes, and offertory. He picks whatever music the choirs do, and I appreciate everything our music ministry offers to our worship. I pick the hymns. I start with the hymnal and try to rotate in

some contemporary songs from the spiral book and from other resources I keep around. If I don't know a song, I look it up online so I can hear it. If it's a song in a minor key, I will occasionally use the tune index in the back of the hymnal to switch to more upbeat tune. I am so grateful our choir rehearses hymns, especially when it's a new hymn. And I love doing hymn requests in the summer to hear the old favorites or songs you love we don't sing very often. But people can request hymns at any time, and I'll try to work them in where we can.

Once the scriptures, sermon, and hymns are selected, I turn to the liturgy—the parts the worship assistants help with, like the call to worship and offertory, and the parts I do like the prayer of confession. I have books to help with those parts. This spring we're hoping to put together a team to write some of our own liturgy, which I'm really excited about. I put all of the worship

components into a Google document and our awesome church secretary puts the bulletins together. A dedicated volunteer comes in weekly to help edit the bulletin. We get the slides done for the screens, and it all comes together for Sunday. So many hands go into making our worship work, and I'm so grateful for each and every hand, eye, voice, and song that makes our Sunday morning worship happen. We do try to shake things up from time to time, but for the most part we stick to a worship routine because it creates habits, and some habits are healthy.

Defining worship and deciding as a congregation *how* to worship circles back to the ultimate question, which is *why* we worship. We worship to glorify God, not ourselves. We hang out with God because of God. That's why we don't use words like "performing." It's not about us. We do want to connect to worship, but only inasmuch as it helps us connect to God. Coming to worship is not about being fed, although I do hope you hear or experience

something in worship that helps sustain you for the week. More than just sustaining you, I hope something you hear or experience in worship spurs you to be more aware of how you connect to your community during the week - your community at work, at school, at home, or town. We worship to love God and to learn and relearn how to go back into the world and love our neighbors as we love ourselves. Worship isn't supposed to just make you feel good: it's supposed to inspire but also challenge, bring you comfort but also occasionally make you uncomfortable. God can be very good about bringing us out of our comfort zones!

I encourage you to think about why you worship and how you worship. I do believe our worship is stronger when we worship together; but, consider also how it might look if you saw everything you do and say through the lens of worship.


We continue to seek ways to enhance our worship experience, and appreciate your willingness to share your thoughts with any of our committee members.


Youth:



ach year during the Advent and Christmas season, we turn our eyes to Bethlehem and celebrate the wondrous gift of Jesus Christ, our Savior. By giving to the Christmas Joy Offering, you honor this gift by providing assistance to current and retired church workers in their time of need and developing our future leaders at Presbyterian-related racial ethnic schools and colleges.

The *Christmas Joy Offering* will be received and dedicated on **December 22**, **2019**. The offering is used to help fund the following programs:

The Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions

In 2018, the Assistance Program distributed over 850 grants and approximately \$1.2 million to qualifying pastors, missionaries, other church workers, and their families. The Assistance Program offers assistance to folks in one of these three categories:

- retired church workers with financial and housing needs
- church workers with urgent financial needs
- pastors with vocational leadership needs

Racial Ethnic Leadership DeveloPMent

The *Christmas Joy Offering* provides opportunities for deserving students to attend Presbyterian-related racial ethnic colleges and schools. In 2018 \$1 million were used to provide education and leadership develoPMent skills at Presbyterian-related racial ethnic schools and colleges.

Mission: The Cost/Benefit Analysis

When the Consign for Good sale began 6 years ago, none of us really knew what we were getting into. But with knowledge from another church and folks that consigned with profit making kids consignment sales, we plunged in. The first sale was an eye opener and since then we have tweaked the process to a science.

If you consider the amount of time, energy and effort put in, you might think we are crazy.

For the most recent sale in September, we had a little over 50 people volunteer for approximately 210 volunteer hours, just during the set-up, sale itself and clean-up. There were several new volunteers from the congregation, consignors, and the community - other churches in area who also support EPNHN. But those numbers do not include the multiple committee meetings, behind the scenes work, tagging events, pick-ups and drop-offs of registrations, fliers, and donated items in and around Emmaus.

The sale itself netted a total of 175 sale transactions with an average per sale of \$25.83. In total over 1,500 items were sold (or as we like to say, repurposed!). From the money we make after the consigners get their 70% and any bills are paid; Consign for Good was able to donate \$2,000 to EPNHN. After 6 years of 12 sales we have donated \$20,000.

Looking at the amount of time and volunteers needed and that we are only able to donate \$2,000, you might wonder why do it? The truth is we love the comradery, we are grateful to help families get the items they need for babies and young children at a fraction of the cost, and we know we can help one family by sharing in the mission of East Penn Neighbors Helping Neighbors (EPNHN).

When you see the next Consign for Good is happening, consider how you might get involved. We are grateful for the varied ways that folks contribute to the cause. As long as we are able and it gives life to us those we serve, we will keep going. As we were told in a recent note from EPNHN, "*This work in our neighborhood is so important, and through you - change is occurring"*.

Faith Presbyterian Church of Emmaus will conclude its 25th Anniversary Celebration this Sunday with a series of special events.

The church service at 10 a.m. will feature guest speaker Rev. Daniel C. Thomas, former pastor of First Presbyterian Church in Allentown and currently Secretary of Princeton Theological Seminary.

A slide presentation on Faith Membership in Action will follow and a full course banquet will begin at noon.

Special recognition will be made of the church's 18 charter members.

The adult choir and youth choirs are recording a long-playing record which will be sold later. A church member has paid for the cost of making the record.

Faith Presbyterian marks 25th year

Faith Presbyterian Church of Emmaus began celebration of its 25th anniversary this month, with a variety of special events planned through April, 1983.

Theme for the celebration, "Dedication to Growth," according to the Rev. J. Earl Naegele, "involves our growth inwardly, spritually; growth in knowledge of our faith, history and traditions, and growth of the congregation in terms of new members."

Pastor Naegele said that 18 of the original 56 members of the congregation attended the celebration kick-off service Oct. 3, and were then honored at a special reception.

The celebration highlight will be in late April with a choir cantata and congregational banquet. Other special anniversary activities will include planting of trees by the Sunday SChool, cutting of a commemorative record by the youth and adult

choirs, a compilation of a church history and other historical information.

It was on Oct. 1, 1957, that 25 interested people gathered in a former beauty parlor on Harrison Street to provide the roots for the church which is now located at 910 N. 2nd St.

The Lehigh Presbytery had determined there was a need to serve the growing Emmaus area in the 50s, and Rev. Gilbert Blake Dodd then launched the mission church, conducting that first service.

The church grew steadily in membership, and moved progressively to other locations: a former St. Margaret's Episcopal Church building at 4th and Broad streets, the Emmaus Theater for a time, and, subsequently, in 1961, into its present sanctuary. The original facility was expanded in 1972 to include a fellowship hall, school rooms, kitchen and offices. The sanctuary was also expanded.

A brief history of birthday celebrations.

SCRIP Program

F aith Church uses a scrip fundraising program, allowing church members to raise money for the church in an easy way to pay for everyday purchases using gift cards in place of cash, checks, and credit cards. You simply purchase gift cards from the church at face value. **A little planning ahead is all that is needed.**

Example. If one person purchases a \$100 gift card from a vendor giving a 10% reduced price, it's an instant rebate to the church in the amount of \$10. If ten people do it, it's \$100. If that happens every month, it's \$1,200!

Most vendors provide rebates in lower percentages, but every penny counts! Why not give it a try this month and see how easy it is? A list of retailers has been posted online, or you can click on the quick link at the bottom of the page at Great Lakes Scrip's website www.shopwithscrip.com and open the retailer list. The church's scrip coordinator orders the cards at a reduced price, the difference in price an **instant rebate for the church**. Session directed that this year's funds **replenish the Pastor's Discretionary Fund...**. The Pastor's Discretionary Fund is available for the pastor to use to assist members of the church or community who may be in need. While the money spent is reported to the administration team, the names of the recipients are kept confidential by the pastor.

Thank you to those who have joined our regular purchasers in the Great Lakes SCRIP and Weis gift card programs. We had a very nice profit from the August order. Won't you consider helping this program continue to provide funds to the church by making purchases using SCRIP.

- The total amount raised in 2019 is \$424.60.
- The next deadlines are December 1 (a week early to allow for Christmas gift giving), January 12, and February 9.

- Did you know that our big field is part of the Lehigh County Emergency Management Plan? The field is large enough for helicopters to land on for evacuations or transporting people from an evacuation site to Emmaus. Very interesting!
- There is a sign-up chart (for serving communion) on the bulletin board right outside of the office storage closet. Any resting or standing elder or deacon may sign up whenever there are openings.
- If you need cleaning supplies, the janitor's closet is always open and available.
- The counter in the church office is a work space. When you place baskets, boxes
 and bags on the counter, they are in the way of the weekly work flow. Please find
 other places for their placement, and let those who are picking them up know
 where to look.
- Faith Church has "Key Guardians" who hold keys for members' use when the church is not open; John Baittinger and Bruce Kunkle.
- There is a lost and found box in the narthex, by the coat rack, where there is also a collection of coats, hats, etc. that have been forgotten.
- Putting liquid in the trash often results in trickling stains as trash bags are carried through the church to be placed outside. Please dump liquids in a sink before discarding your cups.
