## A Note from the Pastor's Desk

**II D** raise God for the coming New Year." Have you found yourself saying that? Back at the end of summer, I started a countdown to the New Year. We've seen so much happen in the year 2020 and many of us have just been waiting and hoping for the clean slate of 2021. Families experienced all kinds of things in the past year. Some things were pretty stressful. David and I lost two of our dearest loves over Easter weekend when two of our three cats died unexpectedly (one was old, the other was sick, and the fact that they died so close together was just an unfair thing the universe did to us). Both of our parents had health problems. We both had to navigate working from home, as many of you did. 2020 was crazy.

And yet, it's not quite over. As I'm writing this, I'm aware this newsletter covers December as well as January and February. With one foot in 2020 and the other foot in 2021, this newsletter reminds us moving into 2021 will not erase, minimize, or change anything that happened in 2020. For many of us, midnight on December 31 will arrive quietly. January 1 may look a lot like December 31. The New Year does not change anything except the last number on your calendar year.

Which I think means 2020 is not a "lost year" so much as it a different kind of chapter in our story. We still have a

month to go, which means you can still make 2020 end on a high note if you choose (When I think of life as a book, I think of more like a choose-your-ownadventure story than a straight up linear or predictable novel). Perhaps we can start by thinking not just about what we may have lost or given up in 2020, but about what we celebrated in 2020. You may have celebrated a milestone birthday or anniversary. Perhaps a fire truck parade even drove by to help you celebrate. Our church grew in new ways that we may not have been able to experience if the year's circumstances hadn't pushed us forward. If we give ourselves space to think about it, there may be more to celebrate than you think!

2020 is not a lost year. At its core, it wasn't even a bad year, though there were certainly some awful things that happened. And without minimizing the pandemics of the coronavirus and systemic racism, the employment uncertainties, the loss of loved ones and

the doused expectations of vacations... without minimizing the broken spaces, we can both honor our grief and celebrate what we can about the year.

Remember also 2020 is not over. And if we put a lot of hope into 2021 as being the "Savior Year" to bring us away from 2020, I suspect at least some of us will be disappointed or even resentful when some things don't change. So remember: we can't control everything. But we can control ourselves. The only things that really change are the things we ourselves are intentional about changing. It's the difference between a thermostat and a thermometer. People who are thermometers can tell you what the temperature is. They can tell you how things are in this moment. People who are thermostats work to change the temperature. They work to change things, hopefully for the better for themselves and those around them. I encourage you to be like a thermostat, working to change things for the good.

I want to encourage you to make a list. Make a list with your loved one or even just in your own personal journal. Make a list of ten things about the past year that you celebrate. Look back on those ten things and rejoice. Offer everything else up to God and know God both rejoices and mourns with you. And God will be with you into the coming year as you work to make good memories and memories that will hurt. We almost certainly will experience both, as we always do. I wish you many blessings and God's peace as we traverse together into the season of Advent and beyond into the new year. Peace be with you!

# United in Mission: WOF and Daybreak

A lthough our physical church interaction has changed over these last months, the greater mission of the church continues. Women of Faith and Daybreak volunteers have combined to help provide some items for the 40 Christmas bags for the Daybreak clients. In addition to giving 40 pairs of slippers, 40 blankets and 40 pillows, there are pillowcases being made for all of the pillows. At the time of this article, some of the Crazy Quilters who meet at Faith Church have volunteered to sew as well.

Daybreak is providing carry out breakfast and lunch but no dinner at this time. The Faith volunteers as well as the Daybreak staff are missing the once a month interaction as dinner was prepared and relationships formed. There have been numerous changes that have impacted their staff of caring individuals. The support of Faith Church is very much appreciated.

Women of Faith have donated many items to be used in the arts and crafts workshop run for the clients of Daybreak. The reaction when the items were delivered was a blessing to see! The leaders were so excited at the possibilities of creating many new projects. The daily Bingo games were supplied with some items donated to be used as prizes. The Rescue Mission also has benefitted from the shopping skills and rewards of our online guru, Sue Lawall, with enough bonus money to buy 16 hoodies for the residents.

This year has been very different for everyone but a common theme seems to be that we miss interacting with others. It has made us more aware of family ties and perhaps think about the people who do not have much of a support system. Hopefully some of this outreach will let those folks know that others do care about them and their needs.



## **Ministry Focus**

A aith's workcamp mission offers youth an opportunity to repair and transform homes while deepening their faith and building new relationships with their peers, youth leaders, and residents. Home repair projects range from painting, to building decks and wheelchair ramps, to roofing and other general home repairs, but the service projects often are secondary to the spiritual growth that happens when teenagers step out of their own worlds and serve those in need. Beyond the physical transformation that happens in communities, teenagers bring the hope and light of Jesus to the residents they serve.

Since 1992, Faith has been sending youth across the country to serve alongside those in incredible need. More than 130 Faith members have worked on over 500 homes and have contributed over 17,300 on-site hours. More importantly, this life-changing opportunity has been a springboard for many of our youth's spiritual lives as they have gone on to serve communities as international ambassadors, camp leaders, and Peace Corp volunteers.

The residents of the homes receiving repair are also forever changed. Following our 2014 trip to Rochester, NY Miss Conover wrote, "The kids were all such an inspiration to me. They worked so very hard and did an incredible job. They all brought joy to my heart and I will miss each and every one. When we did devotions I could feel the Holy Spirit surrounding these young people. I would have never in a million years believed what hard working, awesome kids would touch my life the way they did."




## Community Building Community

In the book of Acts, the story of Pentecost tells of the amazing way the Holy Spirit pulled together a fragmented and frightened group of Jesus' followers, resting on them and filling them with fresh ways to speak the good news of God's love. The story is told in a way that reminds believers of the tower of Babel in Genesis, where the unity and common purpose of humanity was shatter4ed through pride, misunderstanding and confusion. It was a disaster that shattered human community. I am thinking today how those old stories resonate in new ways during this strange season of the COVID-19 pandemic. In the US and across the globe, people have found common purpose and demonstrated nobility in the face of threat, serving others and preserving life, even while others have allowed fear and crisis to diminish their own humanity and harm the common good. It was, as Dickens once penned, *the best of times and the worst of times.* 

Yet, I am also filled with gratitude for the ways the *new* moment of Pentecost is also unfolding, as good news is demonstrated, transcending differences of language, culture and race, through the gifts, prayers, and diligent work of so many in the Presbyterian family. Since the middle of March, PDA has been able to put two million dollars into the field to respond to COVID-19, grants made possible by faithful gifts over the last few years to the general fund of Presbyterian Disaster Assistance. In the

US, congregations receiving small grands from PDA have expanded the operations of existing food banks and opened new ones. Even while not meeting for in person worship, they have reached out a hand to those in their neighborhoods living without shelter, established new relationships with communities living on the margin, refugees, and people whose lack of access to clean water makes sanitation practices challenging, if not impossible.
